



Empowering Children And Families:

Reading is essential...

A flash of clarity. An "aha" moment. A suddenly illuminated path. The look on the face of a child, who has struggled with reading, when they reach the next level of comprehension. At HFF, we like to refer to these moments as "light switch moments" and they are priceless! The HFF Dowd Education Center Reading Mentorship Program was created to make sure children who struggle with reading get the personal attention they need to learn. The program empowers these children to read, to learn and to have confidence in their abilities. This was the second year of the program and thirty-one volunteer Reading Mentors worked one-on-one with 58 children.

This evolving initiative has become a true mentorship program impacting children's lives beyond reading. Reading Mentors help students mentally and academically prepare for standardized tests, encourages them to have confidence, and helps build their sense of self-worth. These mentors went above and beyond by



helping students with other subjects, like math, encouraging them to value learning, and solidifying the child's connection to the Dowd Education Center. Fourteen volunteers returned this past school year and their enthusiasm was contagious!

Many of our new mentors were inspired by current mentors to get involved. The success of the Reading Mentorship Program comes from the dedication of these volunteers who meet weekly with their mentee to work on the personalized lessons prepared by Erin Priest, Curriculum Coordinator for the HFF Dowd Education Center.

"The impact of homelessness on children often leads to chronic stress and trauma from frequent moves; inconsistent relationships; lack of places to play; and witnessing domestic violence and substance abuse. Being homeless was a trial for the Crosby family, but it was especially difficult for their son Mario. The Homeless Families Foundation began working with them in late December 2015 and helped them move into their own home. Mario, then 8 years old, started attending the Dowd Education Center in February 2016. In the brief time that Mario has been attending the Dowd he and his family have experienced several benefits.

Erin Priest, Dowd Center Curriculum Coordinator, has worked to educate Mario's parents about their rights regarding the development, implementation and ongoing access to education assistance as outlined in an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) for Mario. Erin is also advocating directly with the school district to ensure that Mario undergoes the appropriate evaluations for the IEP process.

There has been a marked improvement in Mario's overall performance at school since enrolling at the Dowd. But most notably, Mario has gained 4 levels in reading! His mother was very proud to tell her Case Manager that for the first time, Mario had read her an entire book without any help! Mario's parents report he is more engaged at home and school, and is finding his own voice as he is learning better ways to express his emotions.

This comes at pivotal time because Mario's mother, Chris, has recently been diagnosed with cancer. The family knows that there will be periods of confusion, anger, and fear ahead for Mario. However, they are comforted knowing Mario will come home each day from the Dowd full of excitement regarding the day's activities. They are also grateful that with each day at the Dowd, Mario learns or improves upon the skills he will need to navigate this confusing time in his life.
