Can stable housing reduce infant mortality?

HFF Lead Housing Stabilization Provider in CelebrateOne's "Healthy Beginnings at Home"

The Homeless Families Foundation (HFF) is a proud partner of CelebrateOne, a Central Ohio coalition that seeks to reduce the region's high infant-mortality rate. The Ohio Housing Finance Agency recently awarded funding to CelebrateOne for Healthy Beginnings at Home (HBAH), a housing stabilization pilot program for pregnant women. The program is designed to assess whether access to housing stabilization intervention and rental subsidies – compared to the usual care that low-income pregnant women receive – will result in improved birth outcomes, decreased rates of infant mortality and stronger health outcomes for women and their infants.

As the lead Housing Stabilization Provider for HBAH, HFF will deliver clinical best practices: person-centered planning, motivational interviewing and trauma-informed care. HFF's housing stabilization specialists will provide: barrier assessment, housing identification and placement, landlord engagement and advocacy, home-based case management, and coordinate linkages for social and medical resources for pregnant women and their children.

Franklin County faces staggering infant mortality rates with three families losing a baby every week, 150 infants dying each year. HFF will provide holistic care for 50 mothers and their children over the next 24 months. These pregnant women, currently experiencing highly unstable living conditions, are from high risk neighborhoods like Franklinton, Hilltop, Morse/161, Near East, Near South, Northeast, Linden and Southeast. These neighborhoods, affected by poverty, food insecurity, cost-burdened households, safety and transportation barriers, face infant mortality rates up to three times that of the rest of the county.

With the support of the Central Ohio community, HFF continues to provide struggling families and their children holistic programs that empower and stabilize. HFF is excited and honored to be a part of this pilot program that can improve the lives of mothers and

infants and provide us with more insight into the needs of this vulnerable population.

Community volunteers work to improve students' math concepts

Many things are difficult for some, yet easy for others. Math is one of them. That is why HFF's Dowd Education Center (DEC) has recruited some very special volunteers to help start a new math curriculum, McGraw-Hill's Number Worlds. Implemented this school year, Number Worlds gives the DEC staff the ability to assess each student's strengths and needs, allowing them to provide the personalized assistance needed to improve their math skills.

The goal of our math mentorship program is to build retention, engage and empower our students mathematically. Each volunteer commits to a 45-minute mentoring session every week October through April. Each volunteer mentors a small group of three to four students in Project-Based Learning lessons that focus on the math concepts that correspond to the students' assessment results.

The volunteers reinforce the math curriculum facilitated during Youth Development portions of the DEC programming using Number Worlds developmentally based workbooks. In addition, the DEC has collaborated with Ohio Department of Education (ODE) to provide a Math Intervention Specialist. The Specialist is at the DEC every day, as an additional resource for our students and volunteers, dedicating one-on-one intervention, as needed.

The DEC also works with dedicated volunteers to help with S.T.E.A.M activities that further strengthen mathematics by demonstrating concepts in real-life application. For example, recording data to research plant and life growth; learning about measurement, timing, and portion in cooking and baking; and discovering pattern, shape and dimension through art.

At HFF, people from all walks of life come together to help families and children who are struggling. HFF is grateful to all its volunteers who play an important role in educating our children and combating family homelessness in Columbus.



A Message from Our Executive Director

Thanks to your generosity, The Homeless Families Foundation made a huge impact toward reducing homelessness and stabilizing the lives of children and families in 2017:

- Over 100 children were provided with quality educational and enrichment activities through HFF's after school and summer programming, with over 60% making improvements in math, reading and social development
- Nearly 230 families were provided SPARK (Supporting Partnerships to Assure Ready Kids), in home educational programming to help their 3 and 4 year olds transition to kindergarten
- Over 200 homeless families ended their homeless situation; moving from emergency shelter to their own apartment in the community
- Nearly 20 families were served through the Beyond Housing prevention programming, with 100% maintaining housing stability

While we are proud of the progress made on behalf of our children and families, we realize there is so much more work to do. I know with the help of you, our passionate donors and volunteers, we will continue to find unique and innovative ways to meet the needs of homeless families and at risk children in 2018.

In my first year as Executive Director, I have been overwhelmed by the passion and hope each of you displays for HFF's mission of nurturing children and stabilizing families. Thank you for your ongoing commitment and unwavering support. Together we will continue to make a difference for our children and their families; striving to help them reach their potential, improve their lives and create an empowered future.
